USACE	<a href="#">Civil - Investigations</a>	\$25,000		The Civil Works allocations are consistent with project selection criteria provided in the Congressional Committee report accompanying the Act that projects, programs or activities (PPAs) to be accomplished with Recovery Act dollars will: 1) Be obligated/executed quickly; 2) Result in high, immediate employment; 3) Have little schedule risk; 4) Be executed by contract or direct hire of temporary labor; and 5) Complete a project phase, a project, an element, or will provide a useful service that does not require additional funding. In addition, as stipulated in the Recovery Act, no funds are used for any PPA that, at the time of the obligation, had not previously received Energy and Water Development Act appropriated funds.
